

Development:

Simple present is also called present simple.



The simple present expresses an action in the present taking place once, never or several times. It is also used for actions that take place one after another and for actions that are set by a timetable or schedule. The simple present also expresses facts in the present.

Use:

- the infinite verb (play) with the personal pronouns *I*, *you*, *we* and *they* (or with the plural form of nouns)
- the verb + s (plays) with the personal pronouns he, she, it (or with the singular form of nouns)

	affirmative	negative	question
I/you/we/they	I play.	I do not play.	Do I play?
he/she/it	He plays.	He does not play.	Does he play?

Use the Simple Present to express the idea that an action is repeated or usual. The action can be a habit, a hobby, a daily event, a scheduled event or something that often happens. It can also be something a person often forgets or usually does not do.

Examples:

- I play tennis.
- She does not play tennis.
- Does he play tennis?
- The train **leaves** every morning at 8 AM.
- The train does not leave at 9 AM.
- When **does** the train usually **leave**?
- She always forgets her purse.
- He never **forgets** his wallet.
- Every twelve months, the Earth circles the Sun.
- **Does** the Sun **circle** the Earth?
